Ramblings on My Study Sabbatical

from Father Val



Peace to all of you from southern Indiana!

This past Saturday I telephoned Father Al Kirk. He told me that last Friday night, and again on Saturday morning, there was a gathering of lectors/readers from St. Patrick's—both new ones and veterans. He estimated that there were twenty-five parishioners for the training. He was very pleased with the spirit and the gathering. So am I!

I want to join you in thanking **Father Al** and **Father Dexter**—together with other priests who also "filled in"—for their caring ministry at St. Patrick's during these past four months.

I'll be leaving Ferdinand, Indiana, toward the end of this week. This weekend, I'll begin my yearly 8-day retreat at our diocesan retreat center in Dancyville, Tennessee (about an hour's drive from Memphis). In fact, I learned from Father Al that he will be making his retreat at Dancyville as well, arriving two days after I do. In fact, every priest in our diocese is expected to make a yearly retreat. Please pray for Father Al and for me...and for those others who will likewise be making this silent retreat, following the Spiritual Exercises of St. Ignatius of Loyola.

As I come to the end of my sabbatical time, I can honestly say that it has exceeded my expectations. This month I've read and studied about health care ethics—many complicated moral issues about care, end-of-life issues, bioethics, and also the *right* of every person to quality health care. In fact, until the last years or so, Roman Catholic ethicists (together with Jewish scholars) were virtually alone in the field of medical ethics. Now, there's a broad interdisciplinary study of medical ethics.

I have also continued my reflections on the conscience and on the decision-making process. Too often in our culture "conscience" might suggest merely "doing my own thing." Instead, we have a rich history, and the church provides insights and teachings on a whole range of questions in our moral life. Catholic moral theology then teaches how the conscience, after weighing the teachings—and the reasons behind the teachings!—calls the person to make decisions within the "sanctuary" of the conscience.

My sabbatical has not only been for reading and study, but also for prayer, exercise, and rest. I'm ready now to return—energized and refreshed.

I want to go over with you an unexpected experience that I had recently in which I experienced anew the need for community. In my immediate family, I have two older sisters and a younger brother. We all live now in Memphis, and they are retired. My brother (five years younger) has been in excellent health and never hospitalized—until Thursday evening, September 28th! He enjoys, as a hobby, being a cyclist. This past June, as he was cycling, he made a too-sharp "u-turn." The bike turned over, and in the fall, one of the bike handles poked him in the abdomen. It was minor, but soon afterwards, Lee told me about it. In late September he went for his yearly physical. He told his doctor about the minor fall and showed him a bruise on his skin in the abdomen area. After an X-ray, nothing showed up.

Well, apparently from the fall, an aneurysm formed on an artery going to his spleen. On Thursday, September 28th, as he was cycling, Lee experienced a terrible pain in his abdomen. He eventually called 911, and an ambulance took him to an ER of one of our hospitals. My family called that night and kept me informed. After a CT scan, they found that the aneurysm had burst. Lee's condition was critical, as he was bleeding internally. That night, he underwent surgery and the burst aneurysm was cauterized successfully. Father Bill Burke—a priest of our diocese and a family friend—stayed with the family at the hospital and celebrated the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick with Lee. Lee was in the ICU for two days. He's back at home now, healing slowly but in no danger.

Being here in southern Indiana, I felt alone and very anxious for my brother. That night, I went to a meeting in a nearby town which I go to every Thursday. The group was a caring support to me that night. Then, early the next morning, I joined the Benedictine Sisters at their monastery in Ferdinand (where their community has been for 150 years!) for Mass, as I do each morning. They were so gentle, compassionate...and they prayed faithfully for Lee.

Looking back, within a twenty-four hour period, I truly *felt* how communities of faith can be a great support. It touched me greatly. That's one big reason I look forward to joining you soon at St. Patrick's. The parish has a rich heritage of prayer, caring and support, and outreach!

The day after my retreat ends, I'll be at St. Patrick's for the 5:15 p.m. Mass on Wednesday, November 8th. And, of course, I look forward to being with all of you on that Sunday, November 12th.
