



USCCB Statement for Observance of Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day

Most Reverend José Gomez, Archbishop, Los Angeles and President, United States Conference of Catholic Bishops:

For much of the past year, America has been reckoning with the legacy of slavery and the persistence of racial injustice in our country. Sadly, it is still true that the "color of our skin" often matters more in our society than the "content of our character," as Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., said a half-century ago.

This year as we commemorate the legacy of this great American, we remember especially Reverend Dr. King's belief in non-violence and the power of love.

As we witnessed in the violence in our cities last summer and in the violence that broke out again last week at the Capitol in Washington, D.C., our country has become too angry, too bitter and too divided.

And as we confront our deep divisions, we face the same choices that Reverend Dr. King and the civil rights movement faced. For us, too, the question is how will we struggle against the injustices in our society, what means will we use?

In 1958, Reverend Dr. King wrote: "Along the way of life, someone must have the sense enough and the morality enough to cut off the chain of hate. This can only be done by projecting the ethics of love to the center of our lives." This is the challenge for every one of us who believes in the promise of America and seeks to renew the soul of this great nation.

In the spirit of Rev. King, we must meet the forces of hate and ignorance with the power of love. We must learn again the wisdom of the Gospel and love our enemies and bless those who oppose us. In this moment, Reverend Dr. King would counsel everyone in public life to seek reconciliation and reject the easy temptation to reprisals and recrimination.

We do not love those who oppose us because they are loveable, or even likable, Reverend Dr. King once said. We love them because God loves them. And by our love, we seek their conversion and friendship, not their humiliation. This is our Christian duty in this moment--to be healers and peacemakers, to overcome evil and lies, not by more of the same, but with words of truth and works of love.

We ask our **Blessed Mother Mary, the Queen of Peace**, to guide us in this moment of transition and uncertainty in our country. May she help us to keep believing in the power of love.

Christian Symbols Didn't Belong at the Capitol Insurrection



The following article by Father Val appeared in the January 14th edition of *The Daily Memphian*.

Horrified, stunned, I watched on the afternoon of January 6th as a mob attacked our nation's Capitol. Together with so many others, I would never have fathomed an insurrection at the Capitol while a joint session of Congress was carrying out its responsibilities as dictated in the U.S. Constitution.

The mob participating in the violent chaos had caps, clothing and flags highlighting President Trump and his MAGA brand. They were the primary visuals during the savagery and fighting within the Capitol building itself, as well as outside on its steps and throughout its plaza.

The rioters besieging the Capitol also carried clear Christian symbols that were plain for all to see. Large crosses were placed prominently outside the Capitol. Signs that read "Jesus Saves" hung conspicuously on the outside walls. A Christian flag, waved by a rioter, was among those held aloft during the rampage. At points, small groups from the mob gathered in prayer, their right arms extended with fervor. In one or another of these groups, a member of Congress joined them.

It needs to be said: In no way did any of these Christian symbols belong in the midst of such cruelty, violence and hatred.

Interwoven among these Christian representations were outright images of religious hatred. They included anti-Semitic symbols, such as T-shirts boldly stating "Auschwitz Camp" and "6 Million" (the number of Jews murdered in concentration camps). A noose was prominent, as well as a Confederate flag, both painful symbols for persons of color within our nation, the noose being a haunting reminder of decades of lynchings in our country.

Christian symbols have been used for hatred before. My seventh-grade teacher at the North Memphis Catholic school I attended, Sister Loretta, told us of a horror she experienced when she was teaching at a school in Mississippi. At the convent where the nuns lived, on the front lawn one morning they found a burning cross. It was a clear message to the religious sisters from the Ku Klux Klan. In the Middle Ages, when the Catholic Church waged the Crusades, flagrant symbols of the faith were prominently shown as so-called people of faith waged a religious war.

The foremost Christian symbol is the cross. It stands for the love of Jesus who nonviolently endured the torture of the cross—the cross being equivalent then to the electric chair in our time. In the face of a brutal death, Jesus chose to show his peaceable witness: "Put your sword back into its sheath, for all who take the sword will perish by the sword. Do you think that I cannot call upon my Father and he will not provide me at this moment with more than twelve legions of angels?" (Matthew 26: 52-53).

This coming weekend, when further mob attacks reportedly are being planned, our nation remembers the witness of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. The church where I worship is four blocks from where Dr. King was martyred. His legacy is especially precious to our city.






