

During January, our bulletin will feature a JEDI Spotlight on St. Patrick Saints-Adjacent—parish connections who may or may not be on the path to canonization, but who are models of heroic virtue for us nonetheless—more champions of Justice, Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion!

Monsignor Martin Riordan

Monsignor Martin Riordan was the Vicar General for the Diocese of Nashville, which was the only diocese in Tennessee in his day. He was also the First Pastor of St. Patrick Catholic Church in

Memphis, Tennessee. He was the pastor here, from the beginning of our Church in 1866 until his death in 1878.

Monsignor Riordan was born on June 20, 1830, to Martin Riordan and Margaret Farrell in Lisgoold, Cloyne, County Cork, Ireland. He served as priest in St. Louis from 1856 -1865. In 1865, he was appointed Vicar General of the Nashville Diocese. The Very Reverend Martin Riordan was sent to Memphis, Tennessee in 1866, where he built St. Patrick's Church and School and purchased the land for Calvary Cemetery.



One of his successors, Father Denis Quinn, third Pastor of St. Patrick's Church, writes in his book, *Heroes and Heroines of Memphis*, that Father Riordan was "the greatest priest he had ever known." Quinn adds that with the old Irish immigrant women of the diocese, Father Riordan was a special favorite: on the eve of all the great Feasts of the Church, especially during the weeks preceding Christmas and Easter, they flocked to him from all parts of the city and surrounding country, for the purpose of "confessing" in Irish. Quinn continues:

His language from the pulpit was so choice, and his knowledge of sacred and profane history so extensive, that the elite of the city, both Protestant and Catholic, flocked to hear him preach. A distinguished Protestant lawyer declared he could listen to the music of Father Riordan's words when... the choir had ceased to interest him. As a profound mathematician, if he had an equal, he assuredly had no superior in the State. Differential calculus, and abstruse problems in geometry seemed to afford him more than ordinary recreation. When teaching and instructing, he was affable and gentle as a child; while in denouncing hypocrisy or knavery, he was confessedly sarcastic and uncompromising.

In July of 1878, Father Riordan was absent from the diocese, recuperating from a severe attack of illness. However, he came back to his parish immediately, as soon as he heard Yellow Fever had struck in Memphis. He traveled from house to house across the city to attend to the sick, until his own strength gave out and he succumbed to the Fever. He was briefly nursed to convalescence by the Josephite Sisters, but through a fatal exposure obtained when he got out of bed too soon, he relapsed. He never left his room again. He died on September 15, 1878, and was buried in Calvary Cemetary, the cemetery he had established.

Fr. Denis Quinn writes of Fr. Riordan's final resting place, "The Priests' mound in Calvary Cemetery, Memphis, enshrines the bones of veritable martyrs. Only some three or four Priests were bound ex-officio to remain in the city during the plague. All the others could have saved their lives. These clergymen are not, and may never be, canonized; but I declare they have done the work of Saints." And indeed, a group of Memphians, our own parishioner Jeanine Blackwell among them, are currently working to bring the Cause of Canonization of Monsignor Martin Riordan before our bishop and the Pope.



Can You Help this Family?

A single mother of three (ages 12, 8, 1) lives in the 38126 zip code. She has a gross monthly income (working part-time @ a hotel) of \$1,000. She has subsidized housing and pays \$335/month. She has assured me she can afford this moving forward.

During the pandemic, she was told the \$335/month would be waived due to her qualifying for federal assistance. Unfortunately, the case worker advocating on her behalf left and the paperwork was not kept current (without her knowledge). To her surprise, she got a letter in the mail last month informing her that the balance she owes is now approaching \$3,600.

The St. Patrick St. Vincent de Paul conference has been able to work out a payment plan for her, but she needs help to catch up


