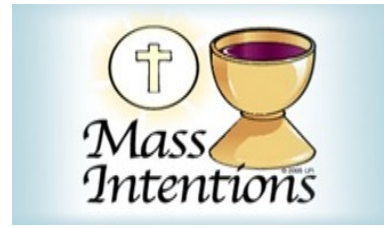

ST. PATRICK PARISH CELEBRATES BLACK HISTORY



Living: Quincy Jones (b.1933)

Quincy Jones is an American musical performer, producer, arranger, and composer whose work encompasses virtually all forms of popular music. Jones was born in Chicago and raised in Bremerton, Washington, where he studied the trumpet and worked locally with the then-unknown pianist-singer Ray Charles. In the early 1950s Jones studied briefly at the prestigious Schillinger House (now Berklee College of Music) in Boston before touring with Lionel Hampton as a trumpeter and arranger. He soon became a prolific freelance arranger. He toured with Dizzy Gillespie's big band in 1956, recorded his first album as a leader in the same year, worked in Paris for the Barclay label as an arranger and producer in the late 1950s, and continued to compose. Back in the United States in 1961, Jones became an artists-and-repertoire director for Mercury Records. In 1964 he was named a vice president at Mercury, thereby becoming one of the first African Americans to hold a top executive position at a major American record label. Jones next worked for the A&M label and moved increasingly away from jazz toward pop music. During this time he became one of the most famous producers in the world, his success enabling him to start his own record label, Qwest, in 1980. Jones's best-known work includes producing an all-time best-selling album, Michael Jackson's *Thriller* (1982), organizing the all-star charity recording "*We Are the World*" (1985), and producing the film *The Color Purple* (1985) and the television series *The Fresh Prince of Bel-Air* (1990–96). Throughout the years, Jones worked with a "who's who" of figures from all fields of popular music. He was nominated for more than 75 Grammy Awards (winning more than 25) and seven Academy Awards and received an Emmy Award for the theme music he wrote for the television miniseries *Roots* (1977). He received a Kennedy Center Honor in 2001 and the National Medal of Arts in 2010. In 2013 Jones was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame.

Deceased: Margaret Bonds (1913-1972)

Margaret Bonds was an American composer, pianist, arranger, and teacher. One of the first Black composers and performers to gain recognition in the United States, she is best remembered today for her popular arrangements of African-American spirituals and frequent collaborations with Langston Hughes. Born in Chicago, Illinois, her father, Monroe Majors, was a physician, lecturer, and author who also was politically active. Her mother, Estella Bonds, was a trained musician who taught piano and served as church choral director and organist. She grew up in her mother's household, a place regularly the hangout for African American students and many of the leading artistic and literary figures that either lived in or visited the Chicago area. Margaret Bonds began studying piano with her mother at a very early age. By the time she reached age eight, she had progressed to studying at the Coleridge-Taylor Music School. Eventually, she studied composition with Florence Price and William Dawson. In 1929, she was admitted to Northwestern University, where she was allowed to study but not to live or use their facilities. Her years there represented her first direct exposure to racism. Three years into her studies, her song, "Sea Ghost," won the prestigious Wanamaker award. She received her master's degree in music from Northwestern in 1934. That same year, she became the first African American to perform with the Chicago Symphony Orchestra, and she was the featured pianist for the Woman's Symphony Orchestra of Chicago's performance of Price's *Piano Concerto in D Minor*. She toured both as part of a piano duo and, in the late 1940's and early 1950's, as soloist playing a variety of classical and contemporary works. One of her most recorded compositions from this period is "*Troubled Water*," from the Spiritual Suite for piano. During the 1950's, Bonds composed a number of works using the poems of Langston Hughes – whom she had finally met in 1936 and with whom she became close friends over the years. When Langston Hughes died in 1967, Bonds suddenly decided to move to Los Angeles, leaving behind Lawrence Richardson, her husband of 27 years, and their 21-year-old daughter, Diane. She worked with the Los Angeles Inner City Cultural Center and Repertory Theater, and she offered music instruction to community youths in the basement of the center.

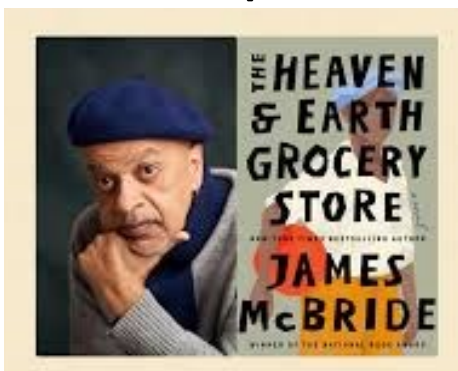

Community Member Spotlight



Dell Stiner: "Who is my neighbor?"

Luke 10:29

Saint Patrick Church is a magnet. It draws all to her doors from every part of the city and from all races, cultures, and economic backgrounds. Those who love the Lord and are yearning to honor the commitment of "and love your neighbor as yourself", enter her doors and are welcomed home.

Fifteen years ago, a wonderful, loving person in the form of Dell Stiner, who knew what was asked of her and answered her Father's call, brought her light and her many, many gifts to St. Patrick. She defined the word, "neighbor" to us. Yes, our city and the surrounding community were indeed our neighbors, but Dell, through her overseas outreach work since 1996, let us know that our hands, our hearts, and our work could reach all the way to Haiti and back. Dell had been going to Haiti to spend months overseeing the small clinic, ministries to the ill and sick and providing scholarships for the students in the village where she stayed. She knew that in Haiti, education was not free. Therefore, from her own funds she provided scholarships for more than eighteen children. The scholarships included tuition, books, supplies, uniforms, and one meal for the children. In many cases, the one meal the children received would be the only meal until they came back to school.

Trained as a nurse, Dell spent a number of years using her talent and skills teaching in schools of nursing, sharing her gift of caring to others. Yet, teaching nursing, caring for the poor in Haiti, and helping to educate the young Haitian children was not enough. Dell is also an attorney. She works in general practice and has worked on several civil rights cases. However, the pandemic and the political turmoil in Haiti cut short her trips to serve her neighbors, but it did not stop her from helping her "neighbor". Each year Dell provides a wonderful, authentic Creole meal (she is originally from Louisiana) to raise funds for the scholarships for the Haitian children of the village.

Dell also gives of herself to her "neighbors" in her church community through her gift as Cantor, Lector, Eucharistic Minister, choir member, member of the fourth Sunday Meal Committee, and wherever she is called to serve. Judi, Kevin, and Paul are blessed to have such a wonderful, caring mother.

"And who is my neighbor?" Ask someone who knows and who loves her neighbor from her entire being - ask Dell Stiner.

A STORY OF HOPE FROM UGANDA



Adolf and his wife, Florence, are farmers in Akwangagwel, Uganda. The couple is dedicated to fighting hunger so that their family and others in their community can build thriving lives. They do this by farming, which helps their family to eat three nutritious meals a day, and by assisting others in their community to grow successful crops. Each member of their household has an important role, like gardening, cleaning, preparing meals and caring for the animals. In the evenings, they enjoy spending time together as a family. Adolf is thankful for the free time to sit and relax with his children.

In the area where they live, the climate is very dry. Lately, the rainy season has been coming later than it used to. And sometimes, it rains too much all at once and causes flooding.

"It rains so heavily and destroys things," Adolf says. "So, the goodness of rain is taken away."

In addition, people come through their community and steal their food or tools. It makes it difficult to farm with these challenges—and that means food is harder to come by.

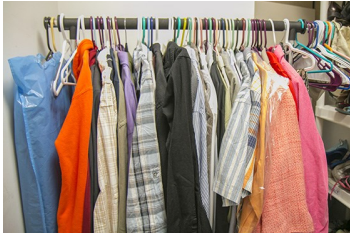
To overcome these obstacles, Adolf and Florence joined a Catholic Relief Services program where they learned new farming methods that help them grow crops even when it is hot and dry. They planted seeds that grow quickly, so that they can still have vegetables to harvest, even if there isn't much rain. This provides enough food to eat and to sell at the market for extra income.

"I have seen my children are happy because they are well fed," Adolf says.

Because of the successful life that he and Florence have built, they are sharing the knowledge they learned with their neighbors. As a leader in his community, Adolf works with others to increase their harvests, improve the land and build a safe and thriving community.

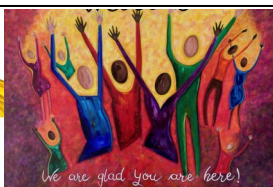
