## **First Communion** Sunday, April 14 11 o'clock Mass



Why are our First Communicants wearing a white alb with a red cross?

At our Baptism our name was called by the Good Shepherd to receive his risen life and enter his sheepfold, the Church. The white garment we wore as infants for our Baptism was a sign that we were "a new creation ... clothed in Christ' And the priest went on to pray: See in this white garment the outward sign of your Christian dignity. With your family ad friends to help you by word and example, bring that dignity unstained into everlasting life. From the youngest ages in the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd we ponder and enjoy the liturgical signs of Baptism, including the white garment. We believe the richness of this sign should not be lost or forgotten. Now we wear it to this new encounter with Jesus in the Eucharist, which is also a foretaste of the heavenly banquet. And we also carry our baptismal candles as a reminder of the gift of the light and life of the Risen Christ which we received in our Baptism, echoed in the words of the prayer the priest prayed: These children of yours have been enlightened by Christ. They are to walk always as children of the light. May they keep the flame of faith alive in their hearts. When the Lord comes, may they go out to meet him with all the saints in the heavenly kingdom.

## **Farewell Announcement from Angelica**

### St Pats,

On October 2, what was a routine doctors visit turned into an emergency pregnancy induction. I was 34 weeks and as I was driving from the doctor's office to the hospital that we had planned to give birth at and I got a call. There was no room at the inn. All the labor and delivery beds were taken and because of this, I was told to go to Baptist Memorial. A hospital I wasn't familiar with. And obviously, this wasn't in my birth plan.

The next two days were high stress. I was in an extremely vulnerable position and my baby was preterm. We knew that she would be taken to the NICU, but that didn't soften the blow of not getting that golden hour with my baby once she was earth side. After I gave birth, I held her for less than a few minutes and they took her from me and to the NICU where she would be cared for by a wonderful team, but at the time, they were all strangers. It broke my heart because she was the only thing I wanted and I'm sure the feeling was mutual. But instead, it was strangers, all around the both of us.

It was one of the hardest things that I've had to face in my life. The next morning, I finally had the chance to really see my baby and meet the strangers caring for her. I was wheeled into the NICU and I'm greeted by a face that I frequently exchanged peace signs and post communion smiles with. It was parishioner Dr. Jane Hayden, and her smile was familiar and heavenly.

She said something along the lines of, "when she came in I saw her and said hey, I know this baby." Immediately, I felt at ease. She was never only with strangers. She was with St Patrick's.

Like many of us, my journey with the Catholic faith isn't straight forward. I've practiced and lapsed, but through my darkest times, I always felt that the good shepherd has been leading me. Leading me, because that shepherd knows me. And they bought me here to this beautiful flock full of sheep that all are like me in many ways. There was one morning in particular where I had gotten to work really early. It was right after Jerry Bettice had passed and I swear, when I walked into that center, I felt his presence and the presence of all that had come before me to help shape this community. It was really powerful. And still every time I enter the center doors to my office, I'm greeted by Allen and Anne smiling at me in the entry way. This church is holy ground and all our holy comrades, past present and future are always in these walls. I have been so blessed to be a part of this family and call this place home.

But it's still hard because in Illinois I have a home too. And every time I return, my parents are a little older, I've missed basketball games, volleyball games, and dance recitals, and my sister is always asking the inevitable. When are you moving back? For a long time I've asked myself the same question. I left when my nephew was still in preschool, now he's a freshman in high school. And I was 18. I'm 29 now. It's hard being the distant sister, aunt and daughter. It's hard turning down wedding invitations and not able to be there for birthday parties.

So, this June, Gloria, Tom and I are moving back home, to help my parents and to be closer to family. St Patrick, Time is a choppy sea. In Kurt Vonnegut's Slaughterhouse 5, there is a concept of an eternal timeline in which all life events exist simultaneously. In a way, like us all, I will always be at St Patrick. I know that this is the best job that I'll ever have and I know I'll be talking about it my entire life. You all have changed my life in more ways than I will ever be able to realize. You've taught me how to unapologetically be authentic in my life and Faith. And you all are family, and I will be back to visit you. I could say so much about how much you mean to us, how much we've grown together, how so many of you have been parents and aunts and uncles and cousins and sisters and brothers. But I can't accurately sum it all up - it's too much. All I can say is I love you and thank you.

## Homily: HE IS RISEN Delivered the Second Sunday in Easter by Deacon James Calicott

"He is risen." This is our Easter proclamation. We proclaim that Jesus the Nazorean is the Christ and that the Christ has come from the grave in the flesh.

While we proclaim this, I think we need to ask ourselves do we actually believe this? And, perhaps, an even larger question would be, who is it that proclaims Christ risen? Is it the two-thousandyear-old Church, or is it you and I? Is it you and I, immersed in modern science and technology, who proclaim the Lord as risen? How many of us will say to someone, anyone, that Jesus lives once we go out of the doors of this church? Perhaps, we, if we are honest with ourselves, find ourselves huddled in an upper room; hud-



dled and hiding from a world that is hostile to the love of Christ, hostile to the real presence of Jesus, in the flesh.

Therefore, we can surely recognize the confusion and concern of the early disciples as well as how we share that confusion and concern. Sharing this confusion and concern allows us to hear what those disciples heard; so, we, too, are able to hear Christ saying "Peace be with you". I ask, some two thousand plus years later, do we find ourselves in a world that is less hostile to the word of God than the world of the Apostles and disciples we read about?

I must say with some sorrow that I do not think so. There is the continued assault on Ukraine by Russia; the current genocide being perpetrated on Palestine at the hands of God's quote chosen end of quote people. There is the usual economic tension between the United States and Russia as fuel for a looming global trade war even as saber rattling increases between the United States and China in the Indo-Pacific. And, do I dare mention our current border crisis where we see armed political violence creating refugees and aliens by driving people from their homes, on the one hand while these same refugees and aliens are met with the political violence and the oppression of dehumanizing conditions where they seek safety on the other hand? We seem to have a government that is not just willing to sacrifice human lives to the pursuit of wealth, but even the very life of our planet so that the rich are able to become richer. We huddle and hide from the needs of "me too", "black lives matter", gun control and many other threats to our lives and humanity. Is it any wonder that we, like the Apostles and disciples look to Jesus the Nazorean, who has been crucified and has risen to change our narrative?

Our history keeps telling us that leaders who champion human right are killed; Jesus, John, Martin and Robert. We struggle with government powers and legal systems that challenges the voice of the people with rules and laws that are not applied to the rich and powerful; representatives ousted for speaking the truth out of turn by those who ignore

policy and procedure, while a former president, along with his supporters, call being held to due process political harassment. We are indeed beset with differences that keep us from being of the one accord that is peace. Yet, for those of us huddled in this upper room, we have to know that the difference that makes us of one accord is Jesus. Jesus, who was not killed, so the tomb where they laid Him is empty.

Jesus, who laid down His life so that He might then be able to take it up again. And, it is because He lives that we can hear our Lord and Savior say today, to us, "Peace be with you". It is this peace of the Lord that more than invites us to repentance. This peace invites us to experience God's Mercy. The peace of the Lord compels us to the conversion that makes us of one accord. It is in conversion that we truly know our Savior. It is in knowing our Savior that we know the Advocate. It is knowing the Advocate that strengthens us to follow His commandments. And, it is in following His commandments that we truly experience "Peace"; the peace of one accord; the peace of Christ. It is only when we follow His commandments that we know that our Savior lives.

Intimately knowing His commandments to love God wholly and our neighbors as ourselves gives us peace when we challenge the political actions that makes and sustains political violence, whether by war or oppression. When we have the peace of Christ, we must be committed to carrying peace with us beyond the walls of this church. You and I, we, have to live in the flesh of the risen Lord. We have to call our leaders, political and religious; to respect the humanity in each person by our own respect of that humanity. We cannot look away from suffering saying I did not cause the problem so the problem is not mine to solve.

We have to pick up the litter actually as well as figuratively to restore our physical as well as our spiritual landscapes. We have to use resources wisely. We have to challenge the creation of food deserts, especially where we are able to leave that desert and others are not. We must demand fair, honest and temperate public discourse. We must share the peace of Christ that we receive in this, our upper room, with the community beyond these

walls in order to realize the fullness of Christ's death and resurrection. It is only the loving care we show our community that calls our community to repent of Its ills and convert to the knowledge that "He is risen". And, we can only do this when we recognize the Divine Mercy that we receive as Easter; the Death and Resurrection of Jesus. For, it is through Jesus' Death and Resurrection that we experience salvation, "peace be with you". It is through Jesus' Death and Resurrection that we experience the fullness of one accord, "peace be with you". Yes, it is through Jesus' Death and Resurrection that we experience the fullness of God's Divine Mercy," peace be with you". --Amen
