

### MISSION STATEMENT

The Mission of St. Patrick Catholic Community is to proclaim and live the Gospel message of unconditional love, healing, and reconciliation, through prayer, celebration, and action on behalf of justice, as a sign of hope for all God's people.



Welcome to Saint Patrick Parish, a Roman Catholic community that gathers day by day, week by week, to be the hands and feet of Jesus Christ. Our close-knit and diverse parish family has been serving our neighborhood since 1866. Young, old, poor, rich, various ethnic origins and differing backgrounds gather to proclaim and live the Gospel message of unconditional love, healing, and reconciliation through prayer, celebration, and action on behalf

of justice as a sign of hope for all God's people. From our lively music to our Catechesis of the Good Shepherd formation program; from our commitment to liturgy being truly "the work of the people" to plentiful social outreach opportunities through our St. Patrick-Champion Outreach Center, St. Pat's continues to be a vibrant community of faith that is centered in prayer and action that extends far beyond the walls of our buildings.

Saint Patrick is the third oldest parish in Memphis following St. Mary in The Pinch and St. Peter downtown. Our community was founded to serve the growing number of working-class Irish families in the south Memphis neighborhoods.

Despite sickness and tragedy of the Yellow Fever Epidemics in Memphis, the community continued to grow. In 1904, construction on a new Romanesque church building began. The parish served as a "mother church" to two new parishes, St. Thomas in Soulsville and Immaculate Conception in Central Gardens during this time. To honor our Irish heritage, the co-patrons of Ireland, Saint Patrick and Saint Brigid are featured on either side of the Holy Family in the apse above the Sanctuary. Our pipe organ is the oldest working pipe organ in Memphis. Completed and dedicated in 1905 by the Bishop of Nashville, Right Reverend Thomas S. Byrne, our gathering space stands today as a testament to not only the enduring spirit of our community, but also our charism of accompanying the people of God through the tests of time. The St. Patrick campus resides on the ancestral homeland of the Quapaw Nation.

In 1954, St. Patrick welcomed the Paulist Fathers, who served our community until 2013. Our time with the Paulists during the Civil Rights Movement, drastic changes to our neighborhood, and changes within the Catholic Church at large imbued our community with our famous radical welcome, commitment to justice and solidarity, and a call to action to love God and each other. As a result of the missionary spirit of the Paulist Fathers, many of our traditions such as an empowered laity, the Good Friday Neighborhood Stations of the Cross, Noyze in the Hood caroling, the first LGBTQ Catholic ministry in Memphis, and various outreach ministries that still root us in place and faith began.

Inspired by the Holy Spirit and Vatican II, St. Patrick became a full-time gathering space for the community and worship and not just a space for Sunday obligation. Taking note from the global Church and the Acts of the Apostles, we choose to forego kneeling and commit to the active act of standing shoulder-to-shoulder in communion with God and each other during Mass. Except during the solemn seasons of Advent and Lent, we clap during the Great Amen and hold hands during the "Our Father." We believe Mass is a celebration, Mass is a feast, Mass is a chance to share in the glory of God together actively and with joy. Some of our members still kneel and we encourage everyone to do what connects them with God and makes them comfortable.

We heartily welcome all who come through our doors and are committed to accompanying each other on all journeys of faith.





#### **BLACK HISTORY MONTH PROFILE**

#### **DEACON EUGENE CHAMPION**

#### "WHATSOVER YOU DO FOR THE LEAST . . . "

A homily was proclaimed this last Sunday that when one is called to do God's work, you need not be afraid you are unqualified, unable, unskilled, or unprepared to accomplish what God has called you to do. When Peter was called to follow Christ, he didn't feel he measured up to what was required of him. He stumbled many times in his walk with Christ and his faith was often put to the test. But one thing he forgot, which was pointed out to us last Sunday, no one is called who is not given the skills, the courage, the faith and the knowledge to succeed.

The homily was proclaimed at the 8:30 Mass on Sunday by Deacon Eugene Champion. He may not have been aware that in proclaiming this gospel, he was also placing himself in the position of saying and feeling, "but not me. I'm not good enough. I'm not worthy enough. I'm not skilled enough. I have too many flaws. I have sinned in my life and 'fallen short of the glory of God." But haven't we all?

Didn't Peter? Didn't Paul? But all went on to do as they were called. To do the work laid out for them. The work that they would be fishers of men and servants of the Lord, doing the will of God to feed his sheep. Not to feed them just with food, but spiritually, and to let them know the love of God which was theirs simply for the asking.

Deacon Eugene would be the first person to say he was not a full-time church goer in his youth. He enjoyed life and enjoyed reaching out and experiencing what the world had in store for him. Unfortunately, or fortunately (however you want to look at it), he fell in love with a minister's daughter. A minister who took him under his wings and accepted him as he was. In 1974 Eugene married the minister's daughter and watched as she converted from the Baptist church to the Catholic Church. He watched as she would leave on Sundays and other days to go to the church she now called home. He watched as she attended retreats and prayer groups. At her confirmation he was there. He knew why she had such a love for her new religion and for her new church home.

Perhaps that was the catalyst which opened his heart to listen to the still voice of Jesus calling to him. Perhaps it was hearing the scripture passage which would be the center of his life from that day forward. The passage that states so simply and beautifully, "When I was hungry you feed me . . . remember whatsoever you do for the least, you do for me." It was then that Eugene, who worked the night shift at Federal Express, would in the mornings get up and go on a Meals on Wheels route he had signed up for. He would take the food to those who were homebound or unable to care for themselves. However, as he stated, it was more than giving them the food, it was seeing them, speaking to them, letting them know they were not alone and that someone cared for them. This was the first step in following the path God had laid out for him.

On days off and when he had any free time, he helped in the church's kitchen and with Ms. Eddie Mae Hawkins in giving out peanut butter and jelly sandwiches to those who came to the door hungry. In addition, he would drive to the Jewish Community Center and pick up the bundles of sandwiches the ladies made for St. Patrick's to distribute to those in need. He also helped to distribute fruits and vegetables given to the church (all of this before the creation of the

current Food Pantry). During this time he also fed the spirits of many of the young people in the church by organizing a basketball team for them. Although they weren't Kobe Bryant, they enjoyed playing among themselves and with other teams (and yes, somehow he got them uniforms.) And he worked with the youth of the church, with Margaret Calicott, helping them with various projects, involving them in diocesan youth programs and taking them on weekend trips. The most notable was to Chicago where they attended Mass at Holy Angels church and enjoyed touring the city.

On March 4, 2000 Eugene was ordained a deacon in the Catholic Church after five years of study. Deacon Eugene, along with 32 of his deacon brothers, was given another step to take to care for the least. Although still hesitated of his skills and abilities he knew he had a call to do what was in his heart. And this was not just for him to serve, but to reach out and bring others into the warmth of Jesus and to know the importance of "and whatsoever you do for the least, you do for me."

It was here that he heard the Lord speaking as he reached out to others to help him feed the community when he started the Soup on Sunday program. He would prepare the soup in his home and carry it to the now constructed St. Patrick's Outreach Center. He would then ask people to help and the program grew to one where anyone who wanted to help feed those in need was welcome. One Sunday a month, parishioners were asked to bring a container of soup to give out to those in need. So many people answered this call ensuring there was always enough. Sometimes it would seem that there would be only a little to give out, but the multiplication of the loaves and fishes was alive in the St. Patrick's community. A multiplication of pea soup, beef stew, minestrone, meatball soup, vegetable soup, and on and on. A miracle that there was always enough and more to share. And on some Sundays there was the famous St. Patrick Special (a mixture of hot and mild sausage cooked with baked beans), corn bread and tea.

After Eugene retired from FedEx in 2007 he was asked to become the director of the Outreach Center. He agreed knowing the Lord would direct his steps and lead him in the path he wanted his call to ministry to go. The third director of the Center, Eugene along with volunteers from the church and across the city brought into being many programs which would care for the needy. With the help of Ken Reardon (a professor at the University of Memphis and church parishioner) they contacted a tremendous number of organizations in the city including, the Grizzlies, MATA, Gibson 5K race, the University of Memphis and countless others to develop a program called "The Green Machine." A city bus was donated to the center and more than \$300,000 was donated to retrofit and operate the renovated bus into a mobile market. The Green Machine went into all areas of the city considered food deserts. The produce was provided (at cost) from the former Easy Way Produce Market. The fruits and vegetables were then sold in the Green Machine also at cost to those in need.

But this was only one of the "feed my sheep" outreach programs developed through the Outreach Center under Deacon Eugene. The simple passing out of the soup on Soup Sunday was upgraded to "More than a Meal." This was thought of by a former parishioner and the initial cash donation brought to life this program. More than a Meal meant that. It elevated helping to feed those who were on the street or our neighbors in need with bringing them in to a sit down meal. The tables were set as you would your own at home with glassware, real plates and flatware. Also to make it not just a handout to those in need, programs were a part of the meal. Sometimes a gospel message, music, choirs singing, and sometimes singing from everyone, or anyone, who was present. It was more than a meal -- it was a family sharing time together, food, and the presence of the Lord in their midst.

Although that should have been enough, another parishioner, Claude Braganza, who designed the Outreach Center, introduced Deacon Eugene to the then director of the Mid-South Continued on Page 13








### **BLACK CATHOLIC SPIRITUALITY**




