### MISSION STATEMENT

*The Mission of St. Patrick Catholic Community is to proclaim and live the Gospel message of unconditional love, healing, and reconciliation, through prayer, celebration, and action on behalf of justice, as a sign of hope for all God's people.* 



Welcome to Saint Patrick Parish, a Roman Catholic community that gathers day by day, week by week, to be the hands and feet of Jesus Christ. Our close-knit and diverse parish family has been serving our neighborhood since 1866. Young, old, poor, rich, various ethnic origins and differing backgrounds gather to proclaim and live the Gospel message of unconditional love, healing, and reconciliation through prayer, celebration, and action on behalf

of justice as a sign of hope for all God's people. From our lively music to our Catechesis of the Good Shepherd formation program; from our commitment to liturgy being truly "the work of the people" to plentiful social outreach opportunities through our St. Patrick-Champion Outreach Center, St. Pat's continues to be a vibrant community of faith that is centered in prayer and action that extends far beyond the walls of our buildings.

Saint Patrick is the third oldest parish in Memphis following St. Mary in The Pinch and St. Peter downtown. Our community was founded to serve the growing number of working-class Irish families in the south Memphis neighborhoods.

Despite sickness and tragedy of the Yellow Fever Epidemics in Memphis, the community continued to grow. In 1904, construction on a new Romanesque church building began. The parish served as a "mother church" to two new parishes, St. Thomas in Soulsville and Immaculate Conception in Central Gardens during this time. To honor our Irish heritage, the co-patrons of Ireland, Saint Patrick and Saint Brigid are featured on either side of the Holy Family in the apse above the Sanctuary. Our pipe organ is the oldest working pipe organ in Memphis. Completed and dedicated in 1905 by the Bishop of Nashville, Right Reverend Thomas S. Byrne, our gathering space stands today as a testament to not only the enduring spirit of our community, but also our charism of accompanying the people of God through the tests of time. The St. Patrick campus resides on the ancestral homeland of the Quapaw Nation.

In 1954, St. Patrick welcomed the Paulist Fathers, who served our community until 2013. Our time with the Paulists during the Civil Rights Movement, drastic changes to our neighborhood, and changes within the Catholic Church at large imbued our community with our famous radical welcome, commitment to justice and solidarity, and a call to action to love God and each other. As a result of the missionary spirit of the Paulist Fathers, many of our traditions such as an empowered laity, the Good Friday Neighborhood Stations of the Cross, Noyze in the Hood caroling, the first LGBTQ Catholic ministry in Memphis, and various outreach ministries that still root us in place and faith began.

Inspired by the Holy Spirit and Vatican II, St. Patrick became a full-time gathering space for the community and worship and not just a space for Sunday obligation. Taking note from the global Church and the Acts of the Apostles, we choose to forego kneeling and commit to the active act of standing shoulder-to-shoulder in communion with God and each other during Mass. Except during the solemn seasons of Advent and Lent, we clap during the Great Amen and hold hands during the "Our Father." We believe Mass is a celebration, Mass is a feast, Mass is a chance to share in the glory of God together actively and with joy. Some of our members still kneel and we encourage everyone to do what connects them with God and makes them comfortable.

We heartily welcome all who come through our doors and are committed to accompanying each other on all journeys of faith.

### **Pope Francis I**

The thing that resonated with people about Pope Francis was his humility and his willingness to connect with people on the margins. More than mere admiration, people saw in those actions, a model of doing good and being good that they could emulate.

We are all created good. Our core trait is goodness, no matter how much wrong we choose to do. Goodness is inborn, unkillable, unsmotherable, resilient, durable and everlasting.

Even though the temptation to act out of selfishness is always there, we have the power to choose to act justly and compassionately.

That is what the pope modeled for us.

His personal goodness and willingness to connect with the marginalized was set against the backdrop of the power and grandeur of his office.

People saw him set much of that aside.

In doing so, he modeled the restraint that Jesus himself modeled. Jesus did not regard equality with God as something to be grasped. Instead he humbled himself, taking the form of a servant, washing the feet of the disciples, etc.

It's not that Pope Francis didn't use the power of his office, it's just not what people connected with the most. People saw in the pope a willingness to set aside the pomp and ceremony and traditional displays of importance to make time for people often ignored.

We have the same opportunity.

I host a podcast called Champions of the Lost Causes. On the show, I talk to people who are operating out of their inborn goodness to effect change in their communities.

Like the pope, they've found ways to set aside the traditional tendencies to pursue the hamster-wheel set of accomplishments that society holds up as ideal.

When people champion a cause big or small, they ignore the traditional success metrics and work toward a desire that is much deeper down, under mountains of ego-borne expectations that do not ultimately satisfy.

We want the world to be better for our having lived.

The world is better and the Church is better for Pope Francis having lived, and we love him because we see in him a model of how the best of us can express itself in our own lives.

I love the film Heavy Metal. In it, the Loch nar is a corrupting green glowing orb. In each of the film's vignettes, set in different time periods, the central figure falls under its corruptive control and chooses to be selfish and do evil. Because of that selfishness, people suffer great harm.

One person is able to resist, though, and the people he chooses not to rule over with might, instead, are able to breathe free.

The Loch nar of our daily temptation wants us to stay on the hamster wheel of power and prestige in this life that is passing away, but we each have the ability to resist that seductive lure and choose to use our limited power in this mortal life to help others. In doing so, we also help ourselves live lives that are satisfying on a deeper level.

When Pope Francis embraced the man with the face horribly disfigured by a genetic condition, our hearts were moved, because we saw a man invested with great power set that power and importance aside to embrace a man most people would pass by.

We have the same capacity, and that is why we love Pope Francis. We see in him the best of what we know lies in us. He has a large sphere of influence, which makes his surrendering it all the more noteworthy, but it is just as important when we do it.

When we set aside power and prestige and rely strictly on the power of self-emptying empathetic love, the redemption of the world and humanity takes another small but important step forward.

G.K. Chesterton once wrote, "The Christian ideal has not been tried and found wanting. It has been found hard and left untried."

His observation is still more true than not, but I would argue that there are people trying to act out of their goodness to change the world. I see that in my podcast guests, in my daily life, in the work of my faith community, and I saw it and admired it in the life of Pope Francis.
